This year a Mercy banner has been designed at the College that outlines six core values of Mercy Education. These values are:


Week of Wellbeing activities






### Deputy Principal's message Mr James Metzeling

#### **Question 1 - Student Survey**


1. In regards to the amount of work provided for you. Do you find the amount of work provided: 166 responses



#### **Question 1 - Parent and Carer Survey**


1. In regards to the amount of work provided for your child. Do you find the amount of work provided:

164 responses




#### **Question 2 - Student Survey**

2. In regards to the academic nature of the work that was set, do you find it: 166 responses




#### **Question 2 - Parent and Carer Survey**

#### **Question 3 - Student Survey**


3. If you are in Yr 7-10, would you like to be involved in a google meet with your class  $^{166}$  responses

# Astronomy ...

Earth...The Ride! by Mr Alex Abbey

If you've ever been to Movie World on the Gold Coast, you may have been dared to go on "Batman...The Ride!", or some such.

You've possibly even had a ride on the Cha Cha at the local Show at some time. As you sit on the ride you are moving in at least three different circles, all at the same time.

No wonder you feel dizzy by the time the ride is over...and probably wishing you hadn't eaten that last hotdog or ice cream.

However, even if you were one of the people wisely watching the Cha Cha from the other side of the barrier...you were still experiencing many different motions, all at the same time!

It's just that throughout your life you have experienced a fine balance of gravity, centrifugal force, and inertia.

The Earth's gravity is trying to pull you towards its core.

At the same time, the Earth spins on its axis once a day (every 24 hours) and this spinning would throw us out into Space if it wasn't for that gravity.

(The Earth's spin is so fast that the fastest military aircraft struggle to keep up with it.)

Then the Earth is also orbiting around our Sun on a journey that takes an entire year (365 and a quarter days).

Add to that the fact that our Sun and our entire Solar System, and all the other stars in our Milky Way Galaxy, are revolving quite quickly around the centre of our galaxy.

(It only takes a couple of hundred million years for the Milky Way to rotate once, but we cover an almost unthinkable rotational distance in that time.)

Then there is the accelerating expansion of the entire Universe because of the Big Bang explosion, so our galaxy is moving away from most other galaxies at breakneck speed.

So next time you look up into the night sky, think for a moment about all these different motions that you are experiencing during every second of your life.

But don't think about it for too long...you might start to feel dizzy.

By the way, even though there really isn't "up" or "down" in Space, the next time you are looking "up" at the night sky, consider that in a way, you are hanging off the bottom of our planet, looking "down" into infinity.

I hope you aren't scared of heights.

While we're thinking about all this motion, let's try to spot a few satellites streaking across the sky.

The Chinese Space Station, Tiangong, which translates to "Heavenly Palace" is the best one to spot at a reasonable hour for the next week or so.

(However, it's much smaller than the International Space Station and therefore not nearly as bright.)

## **Year 11 Exams**

The Year 11 Yearly exams concluded on Wednesday 15th September. The exams assessed the Year 11 students' knowledge, skills and understanding of the course outcomes covered in terms one to three. The exams included multiple choice questions, short answer and extended or essay responses. Students had to answer a range of questions that required them to recall and apply their knowledge, make inferences, solve problems, critically evaluate, make a judgement, troubleshoot for a solution and or analyse.

The online exam experience was not without its challenges. Wifi drop outs, limited internet and hardware breakdowns, for some students, were ever present obstacles. Despite these challenges the students navigated their way through the online exams with patience, resilience and determination.

Congratulations to all Year 11 students for reaching the significant milestone, in their education, by completing the preliminary course study. The Year 11 courses provide an essential foundation for the HSC. Feedback from the exams will provide motivation and direction for students. Term four heralds the final stage of the students' secondary school journey, with the start of the HSC course.
