Principal's message

Greetings to all members of our Red Bend Community,

This is my last communication with you as Principal. Although sad at leaving this wonderful school and the community attached, I do know its time to move on and make way for someone more dynamic and younger than myself. I have absolutely no doubt that in Mr Dwyer you all have an intelligent, dedicated, immensely capable and totally present Principal. He is a fine gift to this community, a man of deep faith and imbued with solid Marist values. In the first RBCC newsletter I ever wrote (8 Feb., 2013) I stated: "Schools exist for students. The dedication, hard work, skills and passion of hundreds of people are channelled to create an institution that aims to maximize the potential of, and opportunities available to, the young people entrusted to its care. This will not be realised without the dedication, hard work and passion of the young people themselves. I hope that each of our students has come to Red Bend to do as well as they can and to make every post a winner in their efforts to achieve their full potential.'

As I look back on all these rich and busy years I feel strongly that what I hoped for in those words has come true for the vast majority of staff and students. No human institution can honestly boast that it has been successful with every person it has been responsible for...that would be nonsense; but it's in accepting that we have all done our best for the greatest number and for the longest time that our deep satisfaction lies. I have wanted Red Bend to be a modern school based on traditional human and educational values; an obviously Catholic school that is open to all; and a model Marist school in which Marcellin Champagnat's way of teaching and his goals can be clearly felt and seen: be with the young; love them; lead them to Jesus; form them to be good Christians and good citizens. Marist schools, in Champagnat's view, were to provide good conditions for the growth of a healthy person...body, mind and spirit.

I am under no illusion that I would have been unable to do this job properly if I had not been so magnificently supported by so many talented and dedicated people: those who were my Deputies at various times, the College Executive, Faculty and House Coordinators; the boarding staff; my superiors at Marist Schools Australia and the Brothers' Province of Australia...I was never "dealt with" by them but always fully supported, encouraged and respected as a professional educator; the whole Admin/Finance team and especially Kylie Biggs, my PA, and those who carried out sensitive and important tasks with professionalism; in fact all the staff who in some way or another helped keep the train on the tracks and did not destroy the goose which laid the golden eggs!!

I want to thank, too, the students both past

and present...you have always afforded me the greatest respect and responded fully to all that was demanded of you and placed before you as a challenge. I loved no aspect of my role here more than any chance to be with you, to get to know you, to speak with you, and to share our "joys and hope, our griefs and anxieties." I endeavoured to share deeply with you my world view based on a spirituality centered on Jesus Christ, the only sane and sensible answer to the problem of human existence.

I am grateful to the vast majority of the parents and carers who supported me and cooperated with the school in many and varied ways. The support received from Bishop Columba and the priests of the Diocese was always appreciated and valued.

All that remains is for me to wish you all a full and happy life, and many blessings for the years ahead. Warm regards to all,

Farewell Assembly for Br Michael

It was a most joyful and fitting celebration acknowledging the contribution Br Michael has made not only here at Red Bend in the past 7 years and over the last 49 years as a Marist Brother. Students, staff and special guests spoke highly of Br Michael in various speeches highlighting his significant contribution to education and his much-valued contribution as Principal of the college since 2013.

Below are extracts from my speech on the day to Br Michael on behalf of the staff and community.

......As you drive through the college gates it is obvious how outstanding the College and its facilities look. From the grounds and gardens to all the buildings and facilities it is clear evidence of Br Michael's meticulous planning and structures that we now have an amazing learning environment that is the envy of many schools throughout Australia. The beautification and redevelopment of our College is due to Br Michael's drive to always improve the facilities for learning and life in our College. We have benefitted from his passion for building projects and his emulation of Marcellin's approach of rolling up his sleeves and making a difference to the lives of others, most importantly the students of Red Bend.

Br Michael has a special place for all aspects of our extra-curricular program. He initiated the Marching Band, the Music Performance Days and especially enjoyed the year where the theme was the Beatles. He sang with the choir and believe it or not he can hold a tune. Br Michael has over the years had much pleasure in celebrating student achievements. He proudly boasts to other Principals that his students excel in a diverse range of extracurricular activities, numerous sporting endeavours, even racoon throwing.

Br Michael is extremely proud of the students and the success they achieve in so many areas. One of these areas is the HSC and ATAR results for Year 12 students. The school was quoted in the Sydney Morning Herald as one of five schools in NSW 'Punching above their weight', in other words achieving HSC results well above the expected level of achievement. Above all else, Br Michael always returns to the core business of a school, that is to ensure that the best possible learning outcomes are achieved by the students. He has fostered a positive learning environment and has invested much time and energy into this. A few examples are; the extensive support and resources in the Learning Support Area, the Homework Centre, external exams such as ICAS, the appointment of Teacher educator, greater collaboration amongst the teachers to review their craft and time and resources for teachers to analyse data to inform their teaching and learning.

In life, you may have heard your parents say, that you don't realise what you have till it has gone. Br Michael shows great care and compassion for all students at Red Bend. This is visible to all in so many ways such as the Breakfast Club for those who miss breakfast or who have travelled a long way to school, the distribution of iceblocks on days when it reaches over 40 degrees, special

BBQs lunches to celebrate special days, the introduction of the House Day to celebrate together, the Principal awards that acknowledge so many people, and he often shouts special dinners for the boarders at his favourite house of cuisine in Forbes, the Wan Wah or a Chinse meal at Trundle. The list is so long, but I think you all get the idea. This is the visible part. You may not realise but behind the scenes Br Michael is selfless with time and energy ensuring that the Red Bend students are cared for, supported to reach their potential and are not impeded in any way to have access to a quality education. If there are any external factors that interrupt a student's ability to learn he will go out of his way to ensure that the barriers are lifted and their well being is protected at all times.

One of the many gifts that Br Michael shares with us is his inspirational presentations at assemblies, staff gatherings and special events. Br Michael's intellect, empathy and compassion empowers him to tell a story and bring it to life in our lived experience. We have all come to know the spirit of St Marcellin Champagnat and Marcellin's trust in Mary as his companion as Br Michael has inspired us with his engaging and insightful presentations. Br Michael challenged each of us to reflect deeply on; who we are in the eyes of Jesus Christ, how we are called to live our lives; and to trust deeply in an abiding faith as St Marcellin did.

Br Michael, you have always shown genuine care and compassion for all members of our community and especially those most in need. Your unending support and consideration for others is an example to us all. Whether it is a student who needs a new uniform, or a family experiencing hardship in times such as drought, or a staff member who is ill, no-one is turned away or inadequately considered.

On a personal note I would like to sincerely thank you for your undivided support and encouragement. Your intellect, wisdom, compassion, crazy sense of humour, creative solutions, dedication and passion for what you do is so inspiring. I feel privileged to have worked with you.

In every part of the world, there are thousands of people whose lives are touched by Marist education and Marist educators. Catholic schools are places to encounter the living God who in Jesus Christ reveals his transforming love and truth. Our Catholic Marist community is no different. Br Michael you have been our driver of the train and you have brought to life Marcellin's dream of Making Jesus Christ known and Loved. In our Catholic Marist community, you have inspired each of us to become Good Christians and Good Citizens.

......It has been Br Michael's great sense of humour, tongue in cheek comments and self-deprecating humility, that has shined through even in the most challenging of times that are faced by a Principal.

One of Br Michael's favourite performers is Elvis Presley. Elvis left the building. Br Michael is leaving us also and there will be no encore, but his legacy as Principal will be long-lasting.



Fieldwork activities for Year 11

On Wednesday 26th June, 16 Year 11 Geography students undertook a day of fieldwork activities around Forbes with Mrs McMillan and Sally Russell who is the Education Officer at Lake Cowal Conservation Centre (LCCS). The fieldwork day began at Lake Forbes where students tested the quality of the water. They used many instruments to measure the temperature, pH levels, turbidity, salinity and dissolved oxygen. They also used nets to collect waterbugs. It was pleasing to see that Lake Forbes had many water bugs living in it. Students used microscopes to identify fly lava, beetles, backswimmers and flatworms. Next they used clinometres to measure the height of trees in the park.

The next part of the fieldwork excursion was on the Lachlan river at Red Bend. Here students discussed the negative impact that humans have on our river systems. They undertook quadrat data recordings at various places on the banks of the Lachlan. They also graphed their data from the transects that they did.

Thank you very much to Sally Russell from LCCC for her time and for her input into all of the fieldwork activities. Students gained valuable fieldwork knowledge that will assist them throughout their senior geography years.


